


POPULATION IN SOUTH TYNESIDE 2010

This bulletin provides a summary of key demographic points for South Tyneside

KEY POINTS

Baseline population...

■ South Tyneside's population rose by 1,300 (or 0.9%) in the year to mid-2010, to 153,700. This is a fall of -5.1% since 1981. Over the same period there was a fall of -3.2% in Tyne and Wear. Over the period 2001-2010 the population in South Tyneside rose by 0.6%, compared to growth of 3.0% in Tyne and Wear.



Ethnic minority representation...

- Experimental statistics for mid-2009 show that ethnic minority groups in South Tyneside made up 6.0% of the total population, compared with 6.7% for Tyne and Wear.
- The largest single ethnic minority group in South Tyneside is Pakistani, accounting for 1.3% of the total population. (The 'Other White¹' group accounts for 1.3%.)

Natural change...

 From mid-2009 to mid-2010 natural change was positive in South Tyneside for the first time since 2002, at +100. In Tyne and Wear the figure was 2,000 (based on ONS 2010 mid-year estimates).

Migration...

Internal (Domestic)


In 2010, South Tyneside had a net gain of +19 through internal migration, compared with a net loss of -355 in 2002. Net internal migration was negative between 2002-2007, and again in 2009. In Tyne and Wear net internal migration has remained negative over the same period, but rose from -1,950 in 2002 to -2,227 in 2010.

International

- Net Total International Migration was positive in South Tyneside in 2010, at 1,164.
- In 2002-03 the number of new National Insurance numbers (NINos) issued to non-UK nationals resident in South Tyneside was 340. The two main groups represented were

Indian (47.1%) and Bangladeshi (11.8%). In 2009-10 there were 540 new numbers issued to non-UK nationals. In 2008-09 the main groups were Indian (59.7%) and Polish (4.5%).



Population projections... The ONS projected population for South Tyneside to 2033 (based on their 2008 Mid-Year Estimates) is 164,800. This is a growth of 8.9% (or 13,400) from 2008. Tyne and Wear is projected to have a 10.3% (or 113,300) growth over the same period.
