

# A Profile of Victims of Crime Newcastle, 2008/09

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# **KEY MESSAGES**

In 2008/09 there were 18,515 (people) victims of crimes committed in Newcastle. Almost four fifths (79%) of these victims lived in Newcastle.

Of victims where the crime was committed in Newcastle in 2008/09:

- Almost one guarter (24%) were subjected to crimes of a violent nature.
- Over one third (36%) were aged 18-29.
- 45% were female. Females accounted for 51% of the resident population of Newcastle.
- 12% were from a Black and Minority Ethnic Group (BME), compared to 7% of the total resident population.
- 52% were in employment.

Of the 15,515 victims who had a home address within Newcastle in 2008/09:

- Over a fifth (21%) were subjected to Violent Crimes.
- Over one third (34%) were aged 18-29, whilst 44% were female.
- 14% were from a BME group.

During 2008/09 4,288 violent crimes were committed in Newcastle:

- 86% were committed by a stranger.
- 94% of male victims compared to 75% of female victims were attacked by a stranger.
- 23% of female violent crime victims were subjected to domestic violence.

During 2008/09 in Newcastle there were on average:

- 357 victims of Violent Crime per month. April to June saw the most victims of this type.
- 613 victims of Violent Crime per day of the week. Saturdays and Sundays saw the highest numbers.
- There was a steady increase in the number of victims of Violent Crime from early morning (6-7am) to a peak between midnight and 1am. Almost half of Violent Crimes occurred between 9pm and 3am.

#### During 2008/09:

- There were 28,762 items of stolen property recorded by Northumbria Police. The total value of property stolen (including that recovered) was £9,003,663.
- 4,671 (16%) stolen items were recovered. The total value of property recovered was £2,112,911.

In 2008/09 there were 9,802 business victims of crime in Newcastle. Almost one third (32%) of these crimes were against Northumbria Police. 41% of all business victims were of Theft Other. This category includes 'Theft from Shops and Stalls' which accounts for over three quarters (3,147) of these Theft Other business victims. During the same year there were 6,548 business victims of crime in Newcastle, where the business 'home' address was given as being in Newcastle.

#### A Profile of Victims of Crime in Newcastle, 2008/09

This report aims to give an overview of the demographic profile of victims, identifying particular groups of people who experience disproportionate levels of crime. Where the crime was committed and the home address of the victim is analysed. The type of property stolen is also profiled, along with a brief profile on businesses that have been victims of crime. Temporal analysis has also been undertaken, as crime trends can be influenced by a range of factors that fluctuate according to time of the week or time of the year.

Data are provided for one year only, 2008/09, therefore care should be taken when drawing conclusions.


# Demographic Profile of Victims of Crime – Where the Crime was Committed in Newcastle

Data within section 1 refers to the characteristics of victims where the crime against them occurred within Newcastle, independent of their home address.

# 1.1 Distribution of Different Types of Crime

In 2008/09 there were 18,515 victims of crime committed in Newcastle.

Almost one quarter (24%) of these victims were subjected to crimes of a violent<sup>1</sup> nature, whilst almost one quarter (24%) were victims of Criminal Damage. Theft Other crimes accounted for 23% of victims in Newcastle (Fig. 1).



<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Violent crime comprises Violence Against the Person (VAP), Sexual offences and Robbery. VAP covers the whole spectrum of assaults from pushing and shoving, with no physical harm, to murder.

# 1.2 Age of Victims

For crimes committed in Newcastle during 2008/09:

- The number of victims of Violence Against the Person increased with age, peaking at age 18-29 before decreasing as age increased from this age onwards. 44% of victims of Violence Against the Person were aged 18-29 despite this age group representing only a quarter of the resident population of Newcastle.
- Almost 40% of victims of Sexual Offences were aged 10-17, this age group accounted for only 9% of the resident population of Newcastle.
- 48% of victims of Robbery were aged under 25 years. Under 25s made up 35% of the resident population of Newcastle. The number of victims of Robbery decreased as age increased from age 30-39 onwards, with 7% of Robbery victims being aged over 60.
- Victims of Burglary Dwellings committed in Newcastle decreased as age increased from 18-29 onwards. 18-29 year olds represented over a third (36%) of burglary victims compared to the 60+ age group which accounted for only 13% of burglaries. 18-29 year olds represent a quarter of the resident population of Newcastle, whilst the 60+ age group represents 20%.
- 82% of victims of Burglary Non-dwelling were aged 30 or over.



- The number of victims of vehicle thefts increased as age increased, peaking at age group 30-39 which accounted for 23% of the victims of Thefts of Vehicles, before decreasing as age continued to increase.
- The largest proportion of victims of Thefts from Vehicles and Theft Other were in the 18-29 group; one third were victims of Thefts from Vehicles, whilst over 40% were victims of Theft Other.
- Almost 30% of victims of Fraud & Forgery were in the 30-39 age group, even though this age group accounted for just 12% of the resident population of Newcastle.
- Almost 50% of victims of Criminal Damage were aged 30-49, even though they accounted for only 25% of the resident population of Newcastle.



### 1.3 Age and Gender of Victims


- 55% of victims of all crime were male; 49% of the population of Newcastle were male.
- 56% of Violence Against the Person offences were committed against males. 29% of male victims of VAP were aged 18-24 despite this age group representing only 16% of the resident population of Newcastle.
- 87% of victims of Sexual Offences were female. 43% of female victims of Sexual Offences were aged 17 or under. Under 17 year olds accounted for only 18% of the female resident population of Newcastle.
- One third of female Sexual Offence victims were aged 18-24. This age group accounted for 16% of female resident population of Newcastle.
- 64% of male victims of Sexual Offences were under 18 years old, despite representing only 20% of the resident population.
- Of all robberies almost one third (29%) of victims were female. 27% of these victims were aged 18-24. Although females in the 60+ age group represented 20% of the resident population of Newcastle they accounted for only 10% of female victims of robberies.
- Just over 70% of robberies that occurred in Newcastle were against males. Of these males 53% were aged 10-24 despite accounting for just over a quarter of the male resident population of Newcastle.




- Over a third (37%) of Burglary Dwelling crimes were committed against female aged 18-29, this age group represented one quarter of the female resident population of Newcastle. Almost 20% of burglaries were committed against female victims aged 30-39 despite only 12% of females in Newcastle being in this age range.
- Almost one quarter (23%) of male Burglary Dwelling victims were aged 18-24.
- Males accounted for slightly over 60% of victims of Burglary Non-dwelling. Over 62% of these male victims were aged 30-59, yet this age group accounted for just 37% of the male resident population.



- 41% of female victims of vehicle thefts and over a third (37%) of victims of Theft from Vehicles were aged 25-39; a disproportionately large number considering this age group represented just 19% of the female resident population of Newcastle.
- 22% of male victims of Vehicle Thefts and 25% of Theft from Vehicles were aged 30-39. This age group made up only 12% of the male resident population of Newcastle.
- One third of female Theft Other victims were aged 18-24. This age group represented only 16% of the female resident population of Newcastle.



- Almost a quarter of female victims of Fraud & Forgery were aged 30-39 even though they accounted for 12% of the female resident population of Newcastle. Of the female victims of Fraud & Forgery just under a third (29%) were aged over 60. Females aged over 60 represented 22% of the resident population of Newcastle.
- Three fifths of male victims of Fraud & Forgery were aged 30-49. This age group accounted for slightly over a quarter of the male resident population.
- One quarter of the female victims of Criminal Damage were aged 30-39. Criminal Damage offences appeared to decrease from age 30-39 years onwards, with females aged 60+ accounting for 8% of victims of Criminal Damage despite making up just over a fifth of the female resident population.



# 1.4 Ethnicity of Victims

- 12% of victims of Violence Against the Person were Black Minority Ethnic (BME) origin, despite representing 10.7% of Newcastle's population. 8% of victims of Violence Against the Person were Asian, even though they represented almost 6% of the population of Newcastle.
- 82% of victims of Robbery were White despite representing 89% of the population of Newcastle.
- 14% of Burglary Dwelling victims were of BME origin, despite the BME population making up 10.7% of the resident population of Newcastle.

- 8% of victims of Theft Other were of BME origin.
- Almost a quarter of victims of Fraud & Forgery were Asian, despite representing only 5.7% of the resident population of Newcastle.
- 15% of victims of Criminal Damage were of BME origin.

### 1.5 Occupation of Victims

- Over a quarter of victims of Violence Against the Person were unemployed, whilst one fifth of victims were either school children or students. Newcastle has a large number of students studying at two Universities. This could account for the large proportion of student victims of Violence Against the Person crimes.
- 51% victims of Sexual Offences were either school children or students.
- Almost a third of Robbery victims were either students or school children.
- 45% of Burglary Dwelling victims were employed. Of Burglary victims in employment, the most commonly targeted were managers, doctors and teachers, combined these three professions represented 12% of Burglary victims (where victims were employed).

- Over two third of vehicle thefts were from the employed. Managers and drivers were the most commonly targeted occupations.
- Almost three quarters of victims of Thefts from Vehicles were in employment. 11% of these victims were Taxi drivers.
- Almost half (48%) of Theft Other victims were in employment, whilst almost a fifth were students.
- 12% of victims of Fraud & Forgery were retired.


# 2. Demographic Profile of Victims of Crime – Where the Victims Live in Newcastle

Data within section 2 refers to the characteristics of victims where the home address was given as being in Newcastle. The crime will have been committed within Tyne & Wear, although not necessarily within Newcastle.

# 2.1 Distribution of Different Types of Crime

In 2008/09 15,515 victims of crime had a home address within Newcastle. The crime will have been committed within the Tyne & Wear, although not necessarily within Newcastle.

Over one fifth (21%) of victims living in Newcastle were subjected to crimes of a violent<sup>2</sup> nature, 21% were subjected to Theft Other, whilst over one quarter (28%) were victims of Criminal Damage (Fig. 2).



# 2.2 Age of Victims

Victims of crimes committed in Tyne & Wear area but living in Newcastle in 2008/09:

- Over 40% of victims of Violence Against the Person who lived in Newcastle were aged 18-29. This age group accounted for only a quarter of the resident population of Newcastle.
- Almost half of victims of Sexual Offences living in Newcastle were aged 17 or under. This age group represented a fifth of the resident population of Newcastle.
- Almost a third (30%) of victims of Robbery were aged 18-24 years. This age group made up 16% of the Newcastle resident population.

Violent crime comprises Violence Against the Person (VAP), Sexual offences and Robbery. VAP covers the whole spectrum of assaults from pushing and shoving, with no physical harm, to murder.

Victims living in Newcastle during 2008/09:

- 44% of victims of Theft of Vehicles and Theft from Vehicles were between 30 and 49 years old. However, only a quarter of the resident population were in this age group.
- Those aged under 25 accounted for 31% of all Theft Other victims. 35% of the resident population of Newcastle were within this age group.
- 30-39 year olds accounted for over a third (35%) of Fraud & Forgery victims, despite making up only 12% of the resident population. 11% of Fraud & Forgery victims were aged 60 or over.
- Almost half of Criminal Damage victims living in Newcastle were aged 30-49. This age group accounted for only a quarter of the resident population of Newcastle.



# 2.3 Age and Gender of Victims

During 2008/09 for those victims living in Newcastle:


- 45% of victims of Violence Against the Person were female. Of these victims over two fifths were aged 18-29 years.
- Over two fifths (42%) of male victims of Violence Against the Person (VAP) were aged 18-29. After this age group the number of victims of VAP decreased as age increased.
- 85% of victims of Sexual Offences were female. 46% of female victims of Sexual Offences were under 18 years old, even though this age group made up less than one fifth of the female resident population.

- 15% of victims of Sexual Offences were male. Of these, two thirds were under 18 years old, despite this age group accounting for 20% of the male residential population of Newcastle.
- Almost three quarters of victims of Robbery living in Newcastle were male. Half of these victims were aged under 25 years old, whilst almost one third were aged 25-39.
- Females aged 18-24 and 40-49 accounted for almost half of female Robbery victims.




During 2008/09 for those victims living in Newcastle:

- 14% of female Burglary Dwelling victims were aged 60 or over.
- 23% of male Burglary Dwelling victims were aged 18-24, whilst 11% were aged 60 or over.




Victims living in Newcastle during 2008/09:

- A little less than one quarter of victims of Vehicle Theft were female. Almost a third of these victims were aged 18-29, with this age group accounting for almost one quarter of the female residential population of Newcastle.
- Almost one quarter of male Theft of Vehicle and Theft from Vehicle victims were aged 30-39. Only 12% of the male residential population of Newcastle were in this age group.
- 31% of victims of Thefts from Vehicles living in Newcastle were female. 40% of these females were aged 18-29.
- Over 40% of victims of Theft Other were aged 18-29, whilst 14% were aged 60 or over. The over 60s accounted for 22% of the female residential population of Newcastle.



- Three quarters of victims of Fraud & Forgery were male. Almost two thirds (65%) of these males were aged 30-49.
- A quarter of female victims of Fraud & Forgery were aged 30-39 and almost a third (29%) were in the 60+ age group.



# 2.4 Ethnicity of Victims

Of victims living in Newcastle during 2008/09:

- 16% of victims of Violence Against the Person were of BME origin. 10.7% of the resident population of Newcastle are of BME origin.
- Over a fifth of Robbery victims were of BME origin.
- 96% of victims of Sexual Offences were White. 89% of the resident population of Newcastle are White.

- 41% of Fraud & Forgery victims living in Newcastle were Asian, despite representing only 5.7% of the total population.
- 16% of Criminal Damage victims living in Newcastle were of BME origin.

# 2.5 Occupation of Victims

#### During 2008/09:

- Almost one quarter (23%) of victims of Violence Against the Person living in Newcastle were either students or school children. Over a third (37%) were employed. Taxi drivers, managers, sales assistants and security guards accounted for 17% of these victims.
- Two fifths of victims of Sexual Offences living in Newcastle were school children.
- 44% of victims of Burglary Dwelling who lived in Newcastle were employed. Of these victims 14% were a manager, teacher, doctor or nurse.
- 15% of victims of Burglary Non-dwelling who lived in Newcastle were retired.

#### During 2008/09:

- Over three fifths of victims of Vehicle Thefts were employed. Drivers and taxi drivers accounted for 7% of victims of Theft of Vehicle.
- 18% of victims of Theft Other offences were students, a further 11% were retired.
- Over three quarters (78%) of victims of Fraud & Forgery with a home address in Newcastle were employed. Three quarters of employed victims were taxi drivers.

# 3. Violent Crime in Newcastle and the Relationship between Victim and Perpetrator

During 2008/09 4,288 violent crimes were committed in Newcastle. Of these crimes the majority (86%) were committed by a stranger. 11.5% of violent crime was classed as domestic violence, where the offence was committed by a known family member or partner<sup>3</sup>.

Victims of violent crime, whose home address was in Newcastle followed a similar proportional split to where the crime was committed in Newcastle, although domestic violence was slightly higher at 14%.\

Men are more likely to be victims of violent crime on the street perpetrated by strangers. During 2008/09, 94% of male victims compared to 75% of female victims were attacked by strangers in Newcastle.

Women are more likely to be victims in the home perpetrated by someone known to them. During 2008/09, 10% of all victims of violent crime were female victims of domestic violence, compared to 1.5% of male victims.

The Tyneside Rape Crisis Centre (TRCC)<sup>4</sup> provides information, support and counselling for women in Gateshead, Newcastle, North and South Tyneside who have been raped or sexually abused. During 2008/09, the TRCC received 287 initial enquiries. 31% of these calls related to adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse and 30% to adult sexual abuse or rape. The majority of women seeking help, 39% of daytime calls and 43% of counselling sessions, were from Newcastle. The centre offers support rather than encouraging victims to report the crimes, though they help women if they decide to do that.

The definition of domestic violence is 'Any incident of threatening behaviour, violence or abuse (psychological, physical, sexual, financial or emotional) between adults who are or have been intimate partners or family members, regardless of gender or sexuality' (Home Office 2005).

# 4. Property-Related Crime in Newcastle

During 2008/09 there were 28,762 items of stolen property recorded by Northumbria Police in Newcastle. 4,671 (16%) of these items were subsequently recovered. The total value of property stolen (including that recovered) was approximately £9,003,663. The total value of property recovered was £2,112,911.

- The most common item stolen was cash, accounting for 8% of all types of property stolen. The total amount of cash stolen was £1,447,685, 16% of the total value of all property stolen.
- Automobile thefts accounted for 3% of all types of property stolen, however, in monetary terms stolen automobiles accounted for over one third (35%) of the total value of all property stolen, the highest for any type of property.
- The most expensive item stolen was recorded as 'cash'; however, this was as a result of employee theft over a long period of time.

## 5. 'Business' Victims in Newcastle

In 2008/09 there were 9,802 business victims of crime in Newcastle (where the crime was committed in Newcastle). Almost one third (32%) of these crimes were against Northumbria Police (this includes crimes against The Crown / Regina).

#### In Newcastle during 2008/09:

- Almost all (99.6%) Violence Against the Person crimes against businesses were against the Police.
- The 60 burglary-dwelling business victims were primarily property management companies, housing associations and the Local Authority Arms Length Management Organisation (ALMO) responsible for managing former council homes.

In 2008/09 there were 6,548 business victims of crime in Newcastle, where the business 'home' address was given as being in Newcastle. The crime will have been committed within Tyne & Wear, although not necessarily within Newcastle. The number of business victims with a 'home' address within Newcastle is much lower than the number of victims of crimes committed in Newcastle, as many organisations record their 'home' address as a headquarters office located outside of Newcastle. This also explains the reduction in the number of Police / Regina victims, as in the majority of cases Northumbria Police Headquarters in Ponteland, Northumberland, outside of Newcastle, is recorded as the victims 'home address'.

• The 48 burglary-dwelling business victims were primarily property management companies, housing associations and the Local Authority Arms Length Management Organisation (ALMO) responsible for managing former council homes.

# 6. Location Profile of Victims in Newcastle


In 2008/09 there were 18,515 victims of crime in Newcastle. 79% of these victims also lived within Newcastle.

11% of victims of crimes committed in Newcastle lived in one of the four other Tyne & Wear districts. Of these 2,041 victims, 42% lived in neighbouring Gateshead and 38% in North Tyneside.

10% of victims of crimes committed in Newcastle lived outside of Tyne & Wear. Almost one half (47%) of these victims came from neighbouring Northumberland; whilst one third came from outside of the North East.






# 7. Temporal Profile of Victims in Newcastle

Crime trends can be influenced by a range of factors that fluctuate according to time of the week or time of the year. Influencing factors include increased alcohol consumption in town centres at the weekend, influx of visitors/tourism, rain and low temperatures and seasonal holidays.

Recording the time at which some types of high volume crime take place can be problematic. For example, when vehicle crime takes place overnight, or when a burglary takes place while the occupier is on holiday. There will be a range, covering the earliest and latest times possible for the offence to have occurred. For the purposes of this report the earliest time and date for the offence to have occurred has been used.


#### During 2008/09 in Newcastle:

- There were on average 357 victims of Violent crime per month. April to June quarter saw the most victims
  of this type of crime. January and March had the highest number of violent crime victims and February the
  lowest.
- There were on average 136 victims of Burglary Dwelling per month. January to March quarter had the most victims of Burglary Dwellings. March had the highest number of Burglary Dwellings victims and June the lowest number.
- There were on average 73 victims of Burglary Non-dwellings per month. January to March quarter had the
  most Burglary Non-dwellings victims. January had the highest number of Burglary Non-dwelling victims
  and April the lowest number.




- There were on average 53 victims of Theft of Vehicle per month. The summer quarter of July to September had the most victims of Theft of Vehicles. September had the highest number of Theft of Vehicle victims and April the lowest.
- On average there were 155 victims of Theft from Vehicle per month. As for Theft of Vehicles, the summer quarter of July to September had the most Theft from Vehicles. July had the highest number of Theft from Vehicles victims and December the lowest.
- There were on average 349 Theft Other victims per month. July to September quarter had the most Theft Other victims. August had the highest number of Theft Other victims and January the lowest.

- There were on average 23 Fraud & Forgery victims per month. April to June quarter had the most Fraud & Forgery victims recorded. April had the highest number of Fraud & Forgery victims (38) whilst October had the lowest (17) number.
- There were on average 388 victims of Criminal Damage per month. The winter quarter of January to March had the most Criminal Damage victims. The number of Criminal Damage victims was highest in March and the lowest in June.




- There were on average 613 victims of Violent Crime per day of the week. Saturdays and Sundays saw the highest numbers of victims of Violent Crime, each accounting for one fifth. This could be due to the increased levels of alcohol-related crimes associated with weekend drinking. The least number of Violent Crime victims were recorded on Wednesdays (399).
- There were on average 234 victims of Burglary Dwelling and 125 of Burglary Non-dwelling per day of the week. Fridays and Saturdays saw the highest numbers of victims of Burglary (Dwelling), whilst Fridays and Sundays were highest for Burglary Non-dwelling. The lowest numbers of victims of Burglaries (Dwelling and Non-dwelling) were on Wednesdays.




#### During 2008/09 in Newcastle:


- The likelihood of being a victim of Theft of or from Vehicles was fairly consistent across the week. There were on average 92 victims of Theft of Vehicles and 266 Theft from Vehicles per day of the week.
- On average there were 598 victims of Theft Other per day of the week. Fridays and Saturdays saw the highest numbers. The least number of Theft Other victims were on Wednesdays.
- The likelihood of being a victim of Fraud & Forgery was consistent across the week. There were on average 39 victims per day of the week.
- There were on average 665 victims of Criminal Damage per day of the week. Saturdays and Sundays saw the highest numbers of victims of Criminal Damage, averaging 860 per day. The least number of Criminal Damage victims were on a Wednesday (424).



- There was a steady increase in the number of victims of violent crime from early morning (6-7am) to a peak between 12am and 1am. The number of victims in the six hours between 9pm and 3am accounted for almost half of all violent crime victims. Between 1am and 6am the number of victims fell sharply.
- There were smaller peaks in the number of violent crime victims between 4-5pm and 8-9pm. Victims aged between 10 and 17 accounted for 25% of all violent crime victims between 4-5pm, possibly coinciding with school children going home from school.
- Those victims of Violent Crime aged 18-24 years were more likely to be a victim between 10pm–3am, than any other age group.
- The number of victims of Burglary Dwelling was fairly evenly split across the day from 8am to midnight. There were small peaks in the number of victims of Burglary Dwelling between 12-1pm and 7-8pm.
- For those retired victims the peak time for Burglary Dwelling crimes was between 11am-12pm and 2-3pm. For those in employment peaks occurred between 8-9am, and 6-8pm.
- The number of victims of Burglary Non-dwelling was fairly evenly split across the day, with small peaks between 12- 1pm and 5-6pm. This was followed by a relatively large dip between 7-8pm. There was a further peak between 11pm-1am, similar to that of Burglary Dwelling.



- There was a steady increase in the number of victims of Vehicle Crime from early morning (6-7am) to a peak between 7-8pm. This could perhaps be explained by workers parking vehicles in car parks or on streets, whilst at work or shopping. Those in employment experienced peaks between 7-8pm and 9-10pm for Theft of Vehicles and between 6-8pm for Theft from vehicles.
- The number of victims of Theft Other crimes increased from early morning (6-7am) to peak between 12-1pm, coinciding with traditional lunchtime hour, and between 10-11pm. The peak time period for victims of Theft Other aged 18-29 was between midnight and 2am.
- The number of victims of Fraud & Forgery was consistently spread across the day.
- The number of victims of Criminal Damage increased from early morning (6-7am) to experience small peaks between 8-9am and 12-1pm, finally reaching its peak between 9-10pm. From 3pm to 10pm the number of Criminal Damage victims increased almost three-fold from 145 to 419.
