


MIGRATION IN NORTH TYNESIDE 2008

This bulletin provides a summary of key migration points for North Tyneside

KEY POINTS

Baseline population...

■ North Tyneside's population rose by 1,300 (or 0.7%) in the year to mid-2008, to 197,300. This is a fall of -0.7% since 1981. Over the same period there was a fall of -5.4% in Tyne and Wear. Over the period 2001-2008 the population in North Tyneside grew by 2.8%, faster than growth of 0.6% in Tyne and Wear.



Ethnic minority representation...

- Experimental statistics for mid-2007 show that ethnic minority groups in North Tyneside made up 3.9% of the total population, compared with 5.8% for Tyne and Wear.
- The largest single ethnic minority group in North Tyneside is Indian, accounting for 0.6% of the total population. (The 'Other White¹' group accounts for 1.6%.)

Natural change...

From mid-2007 to mid-2008 natural change was positive in North Tyneside, at 210². In Tyne and Wear the figure was 1,300 (based on ONS 2008 mid-year estimates).

Migration...

Internal (Domestic)

In 2008 North Tyneside had a net gain of 980 people through net internal migration, compared with 760 in 2002. In Tyne and Wear net internal migration has remained negative over the same period, falling from -2,760 in 2002 to -2,190 in 2008.


<u>International</u>

Net Total International Migration (TIM) was positive in North Tyneside in 2008, at 150.
This is a reduction from 2002 (+250) but reflects a reversal of the losses experienced in 2006 and 2007.

¹ This refers to those who are neither White British, nor White Irish, but White.

² This is rounded to 200 in the Mid-Year Estimates.

■ In 2002-03 the number of new National Insurance numbers (NINos) issued to non-UK nationals resident in North Tyneside was 320. The two main groups represented were Filipino (12.5%) and Indian (9.4%). In 2008-09 there were 460 new numbers issued to non-UK nationals, and the main groups were Polish (19.6%) and Indian (8.7%).



Population projections...

The projected population for North Tyneside to 2021 (based on ONS' 2006-based figures) is 214,400. This is an increase of 9.9% from 2006. Tyne and Wear is projected to have a 3.4% increase over the same period.
