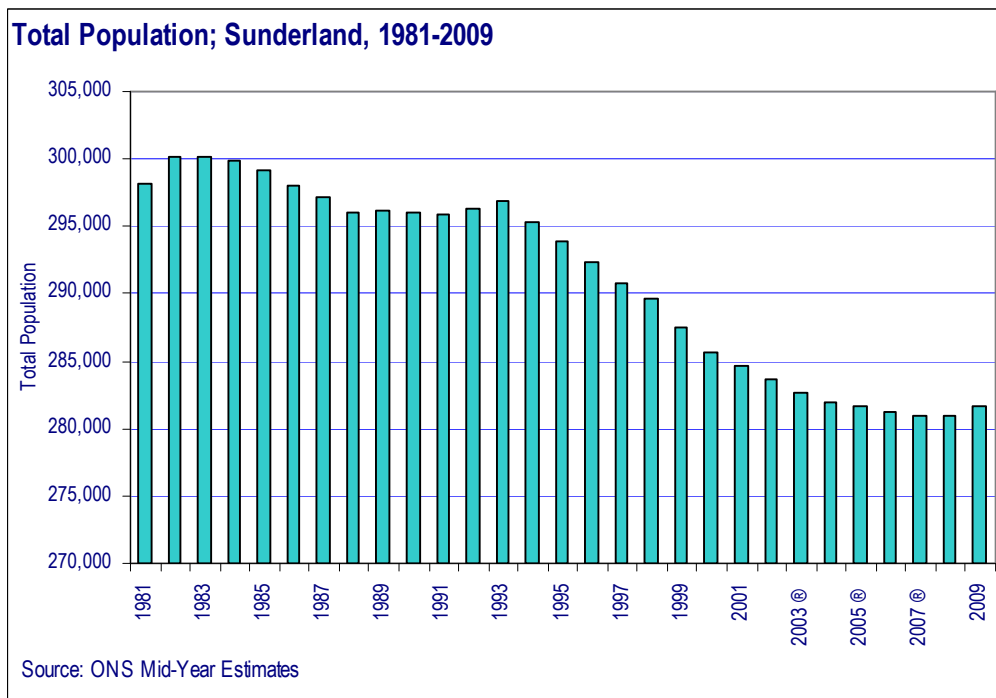


This bulletin provides a summary of key demographic points for Sunderland

KEY POINTS

Baseline population...

- **Sunderland's population rose by 800 (or 0.3%) in the year to mid-2009**, to 281,700. This is a fall of -5.5% since 1981. Over the same period there was a fall of -4.3% in Tyne and Wear. Over the period 2001-2009 the population in Sunderland fell by -1.0%, compared to a growth of 1.8% in Tyne and Wear.



Ethnic minority representation...

- Experimental statistics for mid-2007¹ show that ethnic minority groups in Sunderland made up 3.9% of the total population, compared with 5.8% for Tyne and Wear.
- The two largest ethnic minority groups in Sunderland are Indian and Bangladeshi, each accounting for 0.6% of the total population. (The 'Other White'² group accounts for 1.2%.)

Natural change...

- From mid-2007 to mid-2009 natural change was positive in Sunderland, at 200. In Tyne and Wear the figure was 1,500 (based on ONS 2009 mid-year estimates).

Migration...

Internal (Domestic)

- In 2009, Sunderland had a net loss of -943 through internal migration. Net internal migration remained negative between 2002-2009. In Tyne and Wear net internal migration has remained negative over the same period, but rose from -1,950 in 2002 to -2,364 in 2009.

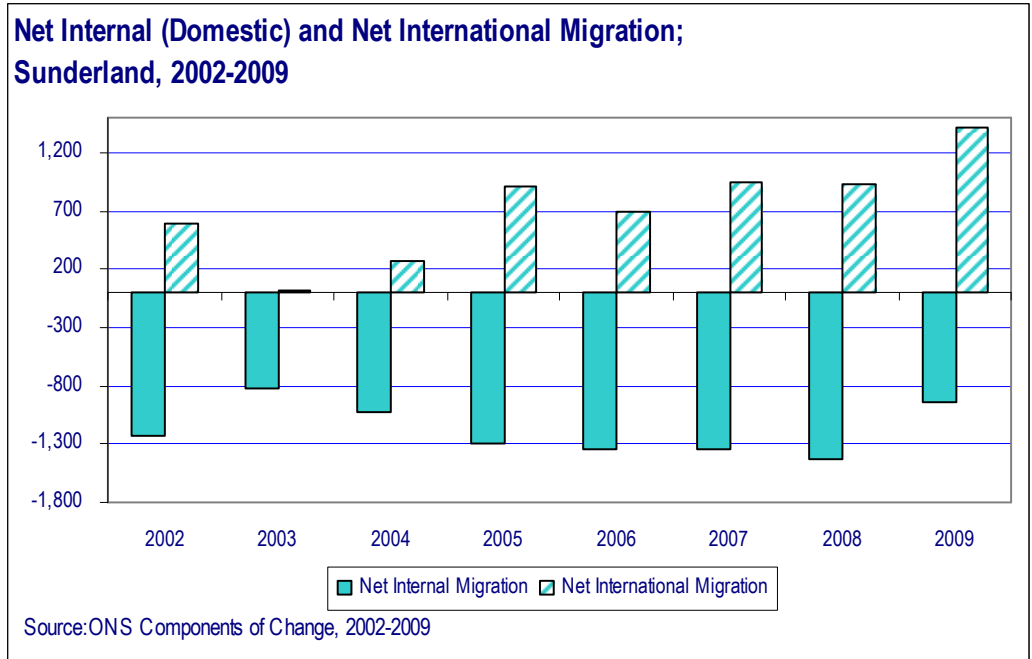
International

- Net Total International Migration (TIM) was strongly positive in Sunderland in 2009, at 1,414. Net TIM was positive throughout the period 2002-2009.

² This refers to those who are neither White British, nor White Irish, but White.

- In 2002-03 the number of new National Insurance numbers (NINos) issued to non-UK nationals resident in Sunderland was 570. The main groups represented were Filipino (14.0%) and Indian, South African and Chinese (all 7.0%). In 2008-09 there were 1,170 new numbers issued to non-UK nationals, and the main groups were Polish (14.5%) and Malaysian (12.0%).



Population projections...

- The ONS projected population for Sunderland to 2033 (based on their 2008 Mid-Year Estimates) is 290,300. This is a growth of 3.3% (or 9,400) from 2008. Tyne and Wear is projected to have a 10.3% (or 113,300) growth over the same period.
