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SUMMARY and KEY POINTS

Labour Market Overview

All three of Tyne and Wear's main labour market indicators improved; surveys, press reports of jobs and claimant unemployment.

- 1 In Q1, on balance, TW firms reported strong workforce growth in manufacturing and a decline in services¹.
- 2 Job Change announcements by firms in TW were positive (gains exceeded losses by about 300 in Q1). This was relatively weak compared to the previous two quarters of very strong growth, however, it was much better than the equivalent period in 2009 when a net loss was recorded. [Caution: this source omits many job losses and timings of the gains coming into effect are variable. See §2 for more details.]
- 3 Claimant unemployment in TW was just below 40,000 in January. It fell in the following three months and, by April, was down by over 3,000 (-7.8%). This was a better performance than the UK (-5.2%).
- Compared to a year ago, claimant unemployment in April was lower in four TW Districts and higher in Newcastle (up by 111). The largest fall was in Sunderland (down by over 1,400). At ward level, rates were higher in 31 of TW's 111 wards. The increases were particularly large in Wallsend (NT) and Walker (Nc).
- But notified vacancies to JobCentre Plus in the quarter to April were down by a fifth from a year before. They are down by almost a third from 2 years ago. In Sunderland notified vacancies were down by half on a year ago.

Caution: normally, the fall in employment associated with a recession can be expected to continue for some quarters after output begins to rise again. This boosts productivity and profitability. Consensus forecasts for the UK

claimant count are consistent with a further rise in Tyne and Wear of about 3,000 over the year to Q4 – which would take the count back to about 40,000; similar to the January total.

Unemployment

In the UK, in April, the seasonally adjusted claimant count was just 11,300 higher (+0.8%) than a year ago. The claimant count fell in five out of the six months from November 2009; the exception was January², which saw a 16,200 rise (+1.0%). It fell by 27,100 in April 2010 (-1.8%), to reach 1.52 million.

Official UK unemployment (using the LFS definition) is estimated to have risen in the 3 months to March, compared with the previous 3 months, by 53,000 to 2.51m. Over the same period the number of inactive people of working age³ rose by 88,000. Almost half of this quarterly rise in inactivity was due to students (+43,000). While the numbers of discouraged workers (-12,000) and temporary sick (-4,000) fell, there were substantial rises in the long-term sick (+25,000) and in those looking after a family or home (+25,000).

Local Job Gains

Large gains in Q1 included 500 at Clipper Windpower Marine in Newcastle and 400 at Nissan in Sunderland (due to the introduction of a temporary third production shift).

Local Job Losses

The biggest loss (900 jobs) was in Sunderland with the closure of Littlewoods' Shop Direct call centre. A second large loss in Sunderland was TRW Systems which is closing its Washington plant (175). Others over 100 were BAE Systems (200) and Wellstream (200) both in Newcastle.

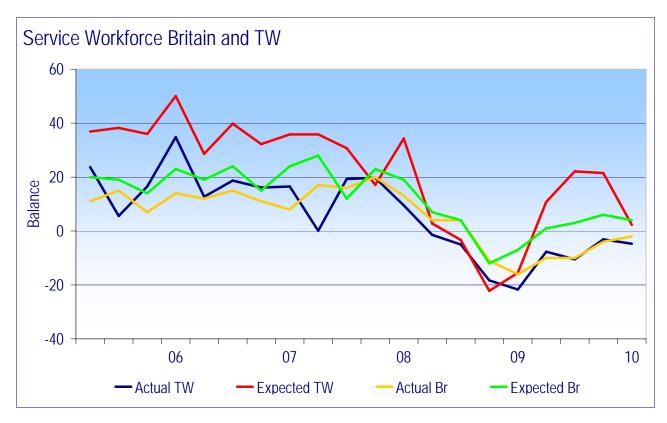

§1: Employment Expectations

In Q1 2010, on balance, service firms in Tyne and Wear recorded a fall in employment. British service firms also recorded a small fall; however, the weighted data show a positive balance nationally.

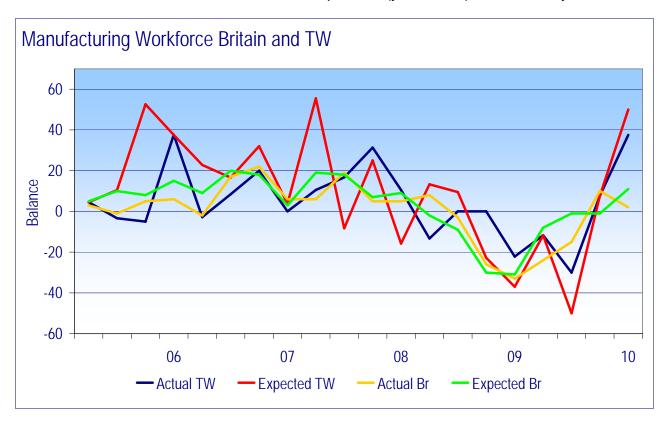
On balance 'actual employment' for Service firms in Tyne and Wear has been negative (i.e. its level has been falling) for the last eight quarters; for Britain the employment balance has been negative for the last six quarters.

On balance, service firms in TW are still expecting employment growth in the next quarter, however, the positive balance dropped sharply in Q1. Historically, TW service firms have usually been over-optimistic by around 15-20pp, whereas British service firms have been so by around 10pp.

For the second successive quarter, Tyne and Wear manufacturing firms reported positive employment change (on balance, blue line). The level is similar to that reported in Q1 2006. For Britain, the latest result was also positive (yellow line), but relatively weak.



Caution: the employment expectations of manufacturing firms (for the next 3 months) are usually poor indications of the actual outturn. In Q3 this was extreme; the record gloomy manufacturing employment prospects (about -50pp) among TW's firms (red line) was followed by employment growth! Although manufacturing firms in TW expected some employment growth in Q1 this underestimated the outturn. The balance for expected employment change in the next three months is a strong +50. This may be due to large rises in export sales and orders in Q1.

§2: Job Change Announcements

Job Changes in the Q1⁴ period (as reported in the press), on a net basis, were positive although losses in Sunderland were high. While recent quarters were more positive, the situation is better than a year ago when a net loss of over a 1,000 was recorded.

Extremely tentatively, this press evidence from 2009 is broadly consistent with the TW private sector economy expanding employment by about 2-2,500pa (or about 0.4-0.5%pa), subject to time 'lags' (delays) with the gains. This is a rough central estimate, with a wide range of uncertainty (possibly of thousands, due to unknown omissions. Note, below, gives explanation).

A full itemised list of reported job gains and losses is given at the end of this report (in size order).

Note on interpretation of press reports of Job Change (JC), aggregated by TWRI:

This source gives good coverage of market services and manufacturing – together about half the economy. It therefore has important gaps ('omissions'), the three main ones being;

- public service employment growth was never reported in any significant way (1997-2007),
- job losses from small retailers are never captured effectively and
- construction (as with other sources) cannot be recorded at all.

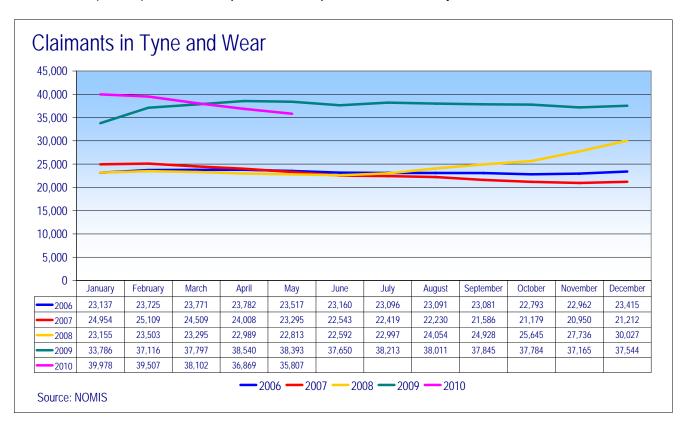
A fourth gap was created through temporary jobs being reported but their demise not being.

TWRI analysis of the long-term series (14 years) has found the JC series typically omitted about 2,000pa job losses (but this is variable). This might be partly explained by the time lags from announced gains to their fruition.

§3: Claimant Unemployment

In Tyne and Wear, following a recent peak in January 2010 claimant unemployment has fallen by over 3,000 (-8%) to 36,869 in April 2010. In the ten months from July 2008 to April 2009 claimant unemployment rose by almost 16,000 in Tyne and Wear, with the majority of the increase occurring between November 2008 and February 2009. This is reflected in the annual average unemployment figures. In 2007 the annual average was 22,833, rising (7%) to 24,478 in 2008. By 2009 the annual average was 37,487, almost two-thirds higher than in 2007.

The chart (below) shows comparison with previous 'normal' years such as 2006 and 2007.



In April 2010, there were over 1,600 fewer claimants in Tyne and Wear than a year earlier (-4.3%); Newcastle was the only Tyne and Wear District with higher unemployment. Claimant unemployment in Tyne and Wear has been on a downward trend since February 2010. Compared to April 2008, Tyne and Wear's claimant unemployment in April 2010 was three-fifths higher; in Gateshead claimant unemployment was almost 75% higher. The increase at county level reflects the sustained rise in claimant unemployment that began in July 2008 and continued until April 2009.

The April 2010 the TW claimant unemployment rate was 0.3 percentage points lower than in April 2009 (7.7%) but 2.6 percentage points higher than in April 2008 (4.8%).

In the year to April, unemployment rates rose in 31 of Tyne and Wear's 111 wards. The increases were particularly large (over about 75 persons) in Wallsend (North Tyneside) and Walker (Newcastle). (See map)

In the Tyne and Wear City Region, claimant unemployment in April 2010 was 4.9% lower than in April 2009; in percentage terms the Durham part (Durham4) benefited most (-6.8%). However, compared to April 2008, unemployment in the Durham4 was almost 93% higher in April 2010.

Claimant unemployment in the North East was 2.6% lower in April 2010 than a year earlier. Conversely UK claimant unemployment was up by 0.7%. In April 2010 the North East rate (6.8%) was 2 percentage points higher than the UK rate (4.8%).

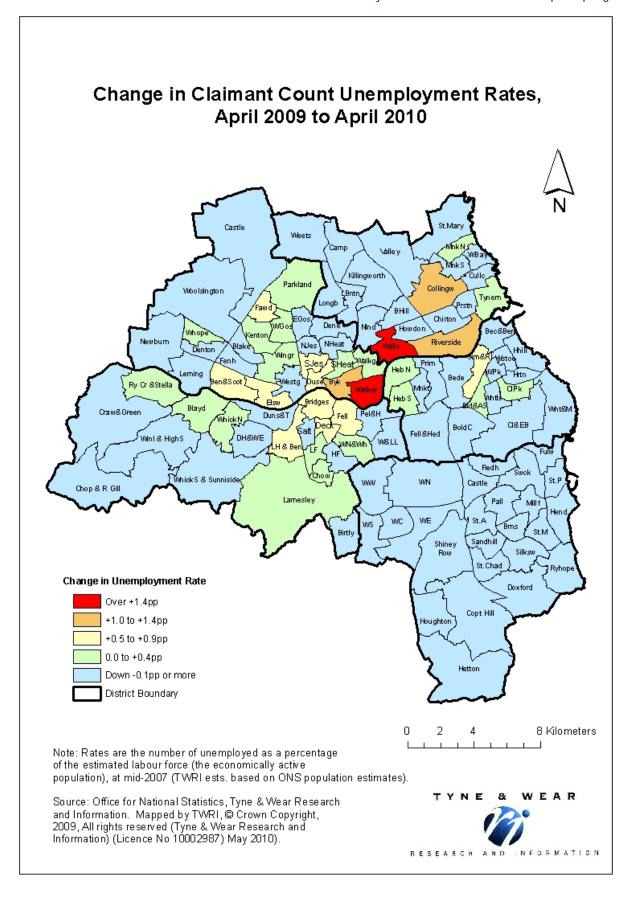

Youth unemployment was lower in all Tyne and Wear Districts in April 2010 compared to April 2009. The slowest percentage fall was in Newcastle, which was still faster than the UK fall. There was a large fall in youth unemployment in Sunderland over the year.

A consortium of Sunderland Council, Gentoo, Connections and Springboard are providing support and mentoring specifically to help the NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training) group within Sunderland. Finance is from the Working Neighbourhood Fund. Sunderland's relative success in this area may also be connected with the use of Future Jobs funding. The rise in long-term unemployment over the year to April 2010 in part reflects the earlier increases in overall unemployment that occurred from mid-2008. The increases in Gateshead and Sunderland are particularly noticeable; the percentage rise in Gateshead is well above that of the UK. In absolute terms, Sunderland accounts for almost a third of the Tyne and Wear rise.

It is possible that TW may fare somewhat better than the UK in 2010, as the NE has a relatively large export-sector. However, provisional data for Q1 2010 shows a quarterly fall in the value of North East exports (-8.0%) and a fall in the number of exporters (-3.5%). This followed a rapid growth (+16.7%) in NE exports in Q4 from Q3; probably including a one-off boost due to re-stocking around the world.

The growth of EU economies is still central to NE exports as three-fifths of exports go here. These markets have begun to grow again and are forecast to grow in 2010 (but slowly).

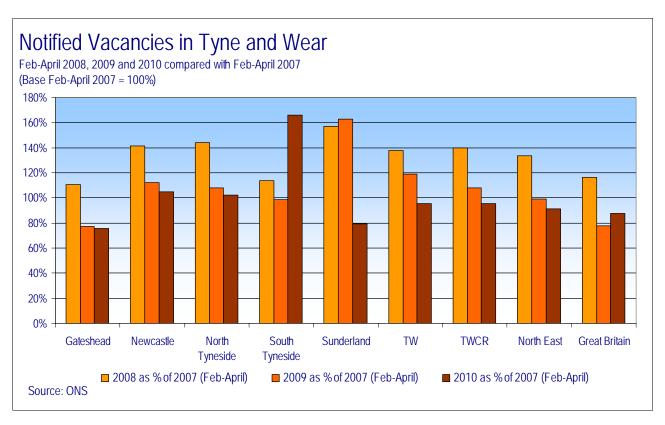

§6: Employment Change by Industry

In the year to December 2009, the North East had slightly slower rates of employment loss in both Production and Construction than the UK. For Services the fall in the North East was slightly faster (-1.2%) than the UK fall (-1.1%). In the North East, total employee jobs fell by 2.2% in the year to December 2009 to 1.013m. In the UK total employees also fell by 2.2%, to 26.435m (All figures seasonally unadjusted).

Employees in the North East peaked in June 2006 at 1.063m but numbers have fallen by 50,000 and the current (December 2009) total is just over a million (seasonally adjusted).



Caution: This regional short-term employment series (STES) has a history of substantial revisions. It was revised upward in 1999 (after the new ABI in 1998) and the rise at end 2005 appears unreal. TWRI advises that the graph should be regarded as a broad indication, not a precise measure. More detail is available in ONS' monthly publication 'Economic and Labour Market Trends.'

TWRI has a database of job gains and losses announced in the press since the beginning of 1996. Listings are available on request by District, industry (2 Digit SIC 80) and cluster. This database and the lists given below, record gains and losses reported in the press.

Caution: The press tends to under-record net job losses overall (by roughly 2,200pa on average, TWRI estimates by comparison with other sources). For example, particularly notable under-recordings have been numerous small losses from retailing and possibly from the offshore engineering industry. The **construction industry is especially hard to track and measure** (and grew very significantly from about 1999 until 2006). Small firms may not be included at all in the data below, since gains of fewer than 10 are sometimes not recorded by TWRI as they are not generally reported by the press.
