*Indicative revised MYE shows the effect of cumulative change on the original MYE Note: the ONS definition of population (following UN standards) excludes short-term international migrants staying for under 12 months. In April 2007, ONS released their 'indicative' revised mid-year estimates (MYEs) for 2002-2005.

These are due to be published in August alongside the new 2006 midyear estimates which incorporate the new methodology. The cumulative reduction in the population of Tyne & Wear is -9,800 against the original 2005 mid-year estimate. Population is reduced in all Tyne & Wear districts with the exception of North Tyneside. (Figures for 2002-2005 can be found on the **TWRI** website.)

Job Gains Slowed in 2006

Net job gains in Tyne & Wear in 2006 dropped about 80% (from a very high level of +8,700 – the second highest level in the last 16 years), to 1,800 (as reported in the Press). This was due mainly to 'Banking & Finance', where net job gains dropped 98%, from 3,368 in 2005. In 2005, large gains in 'Banking & Finance' were at Northern Rock (in Newcastle +1,000 and Sunderland +2,500). Call centre net gains dropped 76%, to 165. In 2006, North Tyneside had the largest gain from call centre jobs, with +600 at EMAX Consulting,

announced in November.

The largest gains (in any industry) in Tyne & Wear in 2006 were from EMAX and Tanfield Electronics (+400 in Sunderland). The largest losses were from HM Revenue & Customs (-790 across Tyne & Wear), Goodyear Dunlop (-585 in Sunderland) and Stag Furniture (-550 in Sunderland).

Earnings in Tyne & Wear 2006

Average earnings reached almost £25,000pa (£24,780) -11% less than in the UK. Men, on average, earn about £2,000pa more and women about £3,000 less than the overall average.

Median earnings are about $\pounds4,000$ lower than the overall average (at $\pounds20,880$).

Over the 8 years since 1998, average earnings have kept up with the UK, rising by 36-37% in both cases.

- Growth of these average earnings, in real terms, was about 13% (in both TW and the UK).
- This is believed to be quite slow growth of real earnings (and thus living standards for people in work) compared with the 1980s and 1990s.

There is evidence of widening earnings gaps:

- The pay of the top 10% of earners has been rising more quickly than the average, by a margin of over 4 percentage points since 1998 (or by about $\frac{1}{2}$ a percentage point annually).
- Also, median earnings have risen about 4 percentage points less quickly than the average (or mean).
- In fact for the middle earner (or median) in Tyne & Wear, earnings in real terms have risen only about 9% since 1998. For the median man, real earnings have risen by only about 6%. For the median woman, however, real earnings have risen by about 18%.

Public sector (hourly) earnings were about 15% higher than in the private sector.

Office for National Statistics in the North East


